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Introduction

The minutes of the Jackson County Commission of Roads and Revenue are found in Road Book Three. This index is for the minutes from February 1853 through April 1866. The commission consists of the chairman, Probate Judge J.G. Dixon, and four elected commissioners. As these minutes began, the following men made up the commission: Lorenzo Russell, Stephenson; Mose Jones, Jones' Cove; Mose Maples, Woodville; and John S. Eustace, Princeton. As the commissioner's term expired, the newly elected member was from the same geographical area. A quorum consist of any three members.

The responsibilities of this commission seem to fall into the following categories:

- A. Overseeing the elected and appointed officials.
- B. Tax assessment and collection, license, and fee schedules.
- C. Appointing Township School Trustee, road overseers, and election officials.
- D. Providing for the retention of prisoners.
- E. Maintenance of the Jail and Courthouse at the Seat of Justice.
- F. Providing for the Poor People--Paupers.
- G. Other.

These minutes reveal the many details of an ongoing county government. The individuals involved are included in the Name Index. The reader should be aware of the possibility that, in 1853, the scribe may have misspelled names and places. Also that your compiler, in 1994, may have interpreted incorrectly. The following abbreviations may assist in identifying some county officials.

The original copy of the minutes of the Jackson County Commissioner's Court--Road Book Three, February 1853 through April 2, 1866, is bound in one book. Historians and genealogists find the book a valuable source of information. The original book is in very poor condition and is not available to the researcher.

The book was copied and the information indexed. It was determined that the Index could not be bound in one book. Therefore, the compiler divided the book in two parts. Each part has an index.

Abstracts by Lewis Wendell Page Sr.

- February 14, 1853. Commissioner's Court. Members present. Probate Judge J.G. Dixon, Chairman Lorenzo Russell, Mose Jones, John S. Eustace and Mose Maples.
During this session, the court appointed road overseers, township school trustees, and election officials. It is noteworthy that Huntsville, Bellefonte--Bolivar Stage Road, was designated first class. All other county roads were classified as third class. 1-21
- February 23, 1853. Commissioner's Court. Members present: Probate Judge J.G. Dixon, Mose Maples, and John S. Eustace.
In addition to regular business, a license to sell spirituous wines and liquors was granted to store keepers in Larkinsville and Pleasant Grove 22
- March 4, 1853. Commissioner's Court approved the appointment of John Stephens as tax assessor for the County of Jackson. The elected assessor J.A. Eaton had died. 23
- August 25, 1853. Commissioner's Court approved travel and lodging expenses for members. Mose Jones was given a ferriage allowance. Mr. Jones lived on Riley's Creek in Jones' Cove and used Subblett's Ferry when crossing the river to Bellefonte. 36
- December 20, 1853. Commissioner's Court awarded the Poorhouse bid to Jessee Womack for \$45 per year per pauper. 42
- January 17, 1854. Commissioner's Court ordered that a nine years old crippled boy named Drent be sent to the poorhouse. 44
- January 19, 1854. Special Term Commissioner's Court members received travel allowance for trip to Bellefonte to examine books of the tax assessor. 45
- February 16, 1854. February term Commissioner's Court. A Ten Penny Ally License was granted to A.P. Bray of the town of Stephenson

- February 1854. An Act of the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Alabama was enacted establishing the bounds of the Scott's Mill Voting Precinct. Also enacted at the same session, "that there be an election held in said precinct at Scott's Mill Station on the first Monday in March next for two Justices of the Peace and a Constable..."

- February 28, 1854. Commissioner's Court ordered that Ledbetter and Lacket are hereby allowed to sell spirituous liquors at Mud Creek. 61
- March 1, 1854. Commissioner's Court ordered that Henry French be authorized

- to convey Peter French who is of unsound mind to the poorhouse of said county. He this day has been declared a pauper. 61
- March 6, 1854. Commissioner's Court heard and approved the report of the inspectors for the special election to incorporate the town of Bellefonte. The vote was 34 yeas and 3 nays. The inspectors were: Caleb B. Roundtree, G.M. Harris, and Ed Reeves. 61
- August 1854. Commissioner's Court ordered that Sheriff John Norwood be allowed \$20 for advertising the election, \$12 for 24 chairs and \$2 for sawdust to be strewn on the courthouse floor. 79
- November 4, 1854. Commissioner's Court. "Know ye that in pursuance of an order from this court..." The citizens of the town of Stephenson have unanimously approved the incorporation of the same. 83
- November 4, 1854. Commissioner's Court ordered that R.H. McCrary be "allowed \$100 for building a plank fence around the courthouse." 87
- February 1855. Commissioner's Court. "Ordered by the court..." By several appointments of overseers of the various roads in the county, the court gave the route of the stage road through Jackson County. Starting at the Madison--Jackson County Line, we find this route:
- "Redmond's Old Place to the County Line."
 - "John Redmond's Old Place to Pruitt's Ferry."
 - "Pruitt's Ferry on the Paint Rock to Woodville."
 - "Woodville to James Wright's Place at top of the mountain."
 - "Top of the mountain to William C. Maples, Sr."
 - "William C. Maples to 11 mile post."
 - "Eleven mile post to the nine mile post."
 - "Nine mile post to Roseberry."
 - "Roseberry Creek to Forks of the Road at Ben Hudgin's Place."
 - "Forks of the Road to Bellefonte
- The appointments for road overseers now start at the Tennessee--Alabama State Line. 98
- "State line to Branch opposite Robert Joneses."
 - "Branch opposite Robert Joneses to Bridge at Widow's Creek."
 - "East bank of Widow's Creek, including Bridge to 16 mile post."
 - "Sixteen mile post to Crow Creek."
 - "Crow Creek to Gurley's Place."
 - "Gurley's Place to Mud Creek."
 - "Mud Creek to Town Creek Branch." Bellefonte. 100-101
