The following are results of Scottsboro Alabama municipal elections from 1870-present. It is unclear if an election was held every year as mandated in the incorporation papers. Scottsboro was incorporated in 1868 and again in 1869. The incorporation papers for both are included at the end of this document. The incorporation papers of 1868 call for an election to be held on the first Monday of November 1869 and annually thereafter, for the election of a mayor and four councilmen. The incorporation papers of 1869 call for an election to be held on the first Monday of February 1870 and the same day every year to follow. There is no mention of a November election in the newspapers of 1869. These newspapers were used to research and document elections from 1870-1936: The Progressive Age (1887-1936) Jackson County Sentinel (1929-Present) The Alabama Herald (1872-1882)

For elections from 1940-2020, Scottsboro City Council meeting minute books were used for documentation. A special thanks to Scottsboro City Clerk Whitney Phillips for allowing the use of those minute books/records.

No information could be located for these years, either due to unavailable newspaper archives, no mention of elections in above mentioned archives or the possibility that elections did not occur in some of these years: 1871, 1873, 1909, 1911, 1913.
