KNOW YOUR SCHOOLS

This is one of a series of articles on Jackson County Schools



George Washington Carver High School

Our school, George Washington Carver High School, located in the city of Jackson on Pondera at Mountain Street, serves as the only senior high school for Negroes in Jackson County. The first through the twelfth grades are taught

The school is served by three buses: one bus driven by Thomas Williamson, brings elementary students to Washville elementary school, and high school students to Carver. One bus, driven by Lee Lillian, brings elementary and high school students from Leflore contributing to Carver. One bus, driven by Phyllis Burdette, brings elementary and high school students in attendance from Sibley Park Junior High School from Cedar Grove, Fackler St. Charles, Minn. Mrs. W. H. Burdette, who has been serving the community at Holbrook Public High; high school students from Warren, Cedar Grove, Fackler and Holbrook elementary and high school students from Dry Creek to Carver.

I. T. Robinson is the janitor. Geneva Woodcock, Maud Taylor and J. T. Robinson are trustees. The faculty, their positions and subjects taught are: Rosa T. E. Wynnfield, principal; Algebra and Geometry; Mrs. L. S. Wainwright, Bible, mathematics and Social Studies; Mr. D. Adams, Science, Mathematics and music; Mrs. L. W. Adams, English and Social Studies; Miss K. F. Lewis, Science, Mathematics and mathematics; Mr. R. T. Murphy, music, physical education and 1st and 2nd grades; Mrs. G. B. Parker, 3rd and 4th grades; Mrs. M. W. Whitehead, 5th grade; Mrs. J. F. Shortridge, 6th and 7th grades; Mrs. I. C. Shaw, 8th grade.

The enrollment of 238 at the end of the second month was distributed thus: 1170 grade; 98 second grade; 91 2-4 grade; 81 fourth grade; 81 fifth grade; 78 sixth grade; 74 seventh grade; 51 eighth grade; 37 ninth grade; 26 tenth grade; 15 eleventh grade; 10 twelfth grade. The percentage of attendance was 85; the percentage transported 89; sitting in the lunchroom, 22. A fine graduation class of our students who attend colleges in Alabama A & M College at Normal

We have one concrete block building of eight rooms which houses all tenth grades, inside on a low acre campus with ample room for playgrounds, tennis courts, track, cheerleading and grading. We have the library, but own a few volumes stored in a closet of one of the classrooms. In this room we have sets of American Picture Encyclopedia, one large unabridged dictionary, one large Atlas with state and county volumes of Negro History in addition we have one set of health charts and one set of Social Studies maps.

We offer the state required subjects and the following electives: mobile school music, biology, physics, chemistry, algebra, geometry, world history and general health education. Our high school departments are: music, social studies, science, English, mathematics, physical education. In each of these fields we have teachers with special training in this field.

For our children department we have books and no equipment. In addition to the maps and charts mentioned above, we have, for the home economics department, one electric stove, one refrigerator and three sewing machines for the girls; room we have one sewing table, two folding chairs, a few dishes, sewing stools and collect. There is no gymnasium. The Jackson Club is used for food storage.

Each room is equipped with textbooks, desks, student desk and one of the eight rooms has a teacher's desk. In the paint hall (offices) we have a typewriter, a duplicating machine, a disintegrator, filing cabinet, one radio combination (owned by Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Campfield), a business clock and a program clock. In the auditorium, made by adding doors between two classrooms we have a piano and one wall clock. Identified by the class of '41 is the flag, one wall clock and a recess meter (class of '41).

The organizations sponsored by the school are: Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, P. T. A. variety basketball for girls and boys. Our needs are indeed great, the most outstanding being

those more and better equipped classrooms; an auditorium; gymnasium; indoor toilet facilities; central heating to replace worn out coal heaters; science laboratories and equipment; library and direction; home economics room and equipment; audio-visual aids for teaching; ten-tens room and equipment; adequate lighting for classrooms; better buses; a commercial drug-herb shop for vocational training; a vocational agricultural department.

We feel that these things will help us to make better citizens as well as better men and women of our race and give to the Jackson County's only high school for Negro youth, as the Negro youth is a vital part of the community, and, as our community can progress only in proportion to its people's progress, we feel that everything should be done to plan for a better education for our boys and girls.

FACKLER SCHOOL

The Fackler Negro School is located a distance of a mile west of Fackler, Jackson County.

In this school are taught the first six grades.

The trustees are Dennis Little, Maryland Timberlake and Geo. Jensen. The teacher is Lena Stewart.

The present students enrolled are as follows: first grade, 2; third grade, 4; fourth grade, 2; sixth grade, 1; sixth grade, 2. The average attendance is 75. All students work on farms and attend school at Holbrook after finishing their work here.

The school building consists of six classrooms, a large playground, one classroom and two outdoor toilets.

The needs at Fackler school are building, repairs, library books, playground equipment, building books, musical instrument, one radio, one sewing machine, one stove.
