Jul 23, 1896: "All the vacant houses in and around Pisgah have been rented to parties who will move here to patronize the school." This ad for Pisgah Academy was on the same page.

Feb 13, 1902 PA: Pisgah News. "Professor Brewton lectured to the school Friday afternoon on modern Educational creeds."

Feb 4, 1909 PA: Pisgah column. "Material is being put on the ground for a new school building."

Aug 12, 1909 PA: "Work has been resumed on the new school building and will be pushed to completion."

Nov 1, 1923 PA. Pisgah News. "We are proud of the nice, new modern school buildings which have been effected in Jackson County, and we are proud of all the fine school now being taught. And second to non of these, is Pisgah School, with a splendid faculty of six splendid teacher, and about 250 wide awake pupils. Prof. White and his vocational boys are doing some fine work these days."
